## Energy Auditor

*Also known as an Energy Efficiency Specialist or Home Performance Consultant*

### Job Summary:

Energy Auditors check homes and buildings to find where energy is being wasted. They help residents or businesses find ways to save energy, make buildings more comfortable, and help the environment. Energy Auditors use tools and tests to measure energy use, inspect the building's walls, floors, roof, doors, windows, and heating/cooling systems, and recommend improvements. They also explain their findings to clients and help them make a plan for energy-saving upgrades.

### Why You'll Want to Check This Out!

- **Be a home detective** – use tools and technology to find out how homes waste energy.
- **Work with cool tools** – like thermal cameras and blower doors.
- **Help the planet** – show people how to save energy.
- **Start earning right away** as a Energy Efficiency Technician advancing to an Energy Auditor in 1-2 years.
- **Job security** – energy efficiency is growing fast, and more people need energy audits.
- **Flexible career paths** – move into green building, HVAC, solar, or sustainability consulting.

### A Day on the Job:

- Conduct energy audits of homes and commercial buildings.
- Find opportunities to save energy and suggest improvements.
- Make a plan to implement energy-saving measures.
- Communicate clearly with customers, crew members, and program staff.
- Teach clients energy-saving techniques and best practices.
- Keep accurate records of energy audits and recommendations.
- Stay up to date on energy efficiency technology and industry trends.
- Work with other professionals in the field.

## What You'll Need to Learn:

### Education:

- A high school diploma or equivalent is generally required.

### Training & Certifications:

- Certifications are not always required, but earning one can improve job opportunities. Many community colleges, trade organizations, and training programs offer certificates in energy efficiency or building science.

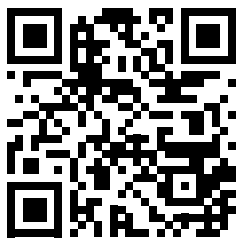
### Training Options:
